The Technical Director, Tony Mannion, has recently reviewed the Draft Forest Service Guidelines on the Use of Pesticides and the Northern Ireland Forest Service Revision of Public Consultation Arrangements. He has also made recent submissions to the Forest Service on Core Funding Support for the Society in 2002 and to Dr. Richard Webb, the FSC Auditor re. the SGS Audit of Coillte's Forest Management Practices.

Forest Service NI Launch New Forest Website

The Northern Ireland Forest Service has launched its own website which contains information on recreational, educational and operational forestry. The web site was designed by their in-house web development team and can be accessed at www.forestserviceni.gov.uk.

On the site, users will find information on the Woodland Grant Scheme and application forms that can be downloaded. Caravan owners may also download Permit Applications for the Touring in the Trees caravan sites. Information on charges, where applicable, are displayed on the relevant Forest Park site.

It is hoped that both domestic and international holiday makers will access the site which provides comprehensive information on activities and location, including the ability to download maps. The site will also be of benefit to users seeking more information on forestry practices and the history of some of Northern Ireland's forests. The website also gives details on all Forest Service NI events, activities and provides a schools programme.

Society of Irish Foresters Graduate Directory


The last five years have seen great development in forest education capacity in Ireland with the initiation of the National

Diploma in Science in Forestry at Waterford Institute of Technology and the National Diploma in Technology in Forest Management at Galway/Mayo Institute of Technology. These courses, in addition to the existing Certificate in Forestry at Teagasc, Ballyhaise and the forestry degree and post-graduate degree programmes at UCD, facilitate a broad range of professional competency for student foresters.

There has never been a better time in Ireland for industry to access the abilities of talented forestry graduates. Also, forestry students have long questioned the relevance of the Society to their particular needs. In light of this, the Education Committee proposed the idea of a graduate directory as a practical service to student members and industry. As such, entry in the directory will be available to student members only.

The objectives of the graduate directory are to provide a service to student members to aid their professional career development and to provide a resource to the Irish forest industry by collating in one directory potential employees' technical competence, practical experience and academic qualifications. It is anticipated that the directory will be published in booklet form on an annual basis around October of each year and posted to all Society members. The directory will cover the current year's graduates only. The collation of all Society members and their graduation dates (rounded up to the nearest decade in some cases) may be considered in future directories. International Seminar on Afforestation in the Context of Sustainable Forest Management

The Forest Service are hosting a major international seminar on Afforestation in the Context of Sustainable Forest Management (SFM) in Ennis, Co. Clare from September 15th to 19th later this year.

The seminar is being organised in conjunction with the joint FAO (Food and Agriculture Organisation), ECE (Economic Commission for Europe) and ILO (International Labour

Organisation) committee on Forest Technology, Management & Training.

Afforestation within the context of SFM extends beyond the simple planting of trees to encapsulate the planting of the right trees in the right places. Given the nature of afforestation as a major change in land use, the activity impacts greatly on the site and its surroundings. It also has wider implications in relation to, for example, the protection of river catchments, landscape management and the provision of an adequate regional infrastructure. The objective of the international seminar is to discuss best practice which ensures that afforestation proceeds in accordance with SFM.

The seminar will specifically address three themes:

- ➤ National and Regional Strategic Planning
- ➤ Local and Site Planning
- ➤ Operational Aspects

The programme is aimed at all those in the international field with an interest in the successful establishment of forests within the context of SFM. These will include professionals from the forestry and environmental sectors, land use specialists, national, regional and local government officials, policy makers and legislators, scientists and researchers, environmental NGO's and the wider stakeholder community. Launch of the Forestry and Timber Association in Northern Ireland

The Forestry and Timber Association was launched in Northern Ireland at Shanes Castle Co. Antrim on the 22nd May 2002. It is the new UK representative forestry body, combining the Ulster Timber Growers Organisation with the Timber Growers Association, and the Association of Professional Foresters.

With 10 regions and over 2,500 members UK wide the Forestry and Timber Association aims to be an effective voice for UK forestry, working along side the Institute of Chartered Foresters. Political and technical representation, information and other benefits are delivered through a regional and national structure, including a new branch in Northern Ireland.

The chairman of the association is Robert Scott of Baronscourt woodlands, Chris Inglis is the Executive Director and is based in Scotland. The director of the Northern Ireland region is James King of Rademon Estate, Co. Down. Membership in Northern Ireland is based on the Ulster Timber Growers Organisation and is open to anyone engaged or interested in forestry, woodlands or trees, whether for commercial, amenity or other reasons. It is hoped that the Forestry and Timber Association will hold two open days each year in members woods.

The association is currently lobbying for changes in the UK planting grant system at the mid-term review due next year. These changes should promote environmental / deciduous woodland while reserving conifer plantations to a minimum of 3 hectares, stocked with market led species. The Forestry and Timber Association will carry out an inventory of their members woodlands and will present this to the Forest Service (NI) to assist in strategic planning. It is understood that close co-operation with the Irish Timber Growers Association will be continued and further meetings are proposed shortly. The Society has also been invited to attend meetings.

WANTED - Volunteers for new hardwood species'improvement groups

As the broadleaf element of the Irish afforestation programme expands, the need to improve quality becomes paramount. This need combined with the growth in interest in broadleaves, which is likely to grow even further with the recent launch of the new Native Woodlands scheme requires that broadleaf quality should now receive even greater attention. Over the past ten years, a similar move has taken place in Britain with the establishment of the British Hardwoods Improvement Programme (BHIP) where representatives from various species interest groups have worked together to improve the quality and productivity of their broadleaved woodland. More recently (since 1997) BHIP has established an Irish link and has incorporated Ireland into its activities and also into its name.

BIHIP is a voluntary association of landowners, research workers and professional foresters, who have an interest and determination to improve the quality and productivity of six broadleaf species with the potential to produce commercial timber, *viz.*, ash, birch, cherry, oak, sweet chestnut and walnut. While sweet chestnut and walnut may not have wide appeal currently, the other four species are very important in Irish broadleaf forestry. Separate programmes are in progress for each of the six species. These groups are expecting to increase the recoverable volume through selection and breeding programmes.

In order to further strengthen the Irish connection we are now inviting Irish participants who have a specific species interest to contact COFORD with a view to establishing species-specific groups for the four main species in Ireland. These species groups would cooperate with the primary species group in Britain and in so doing will strengthen the Irish contribution to BIHIP. Participation in a group may require attending occasional meetings of the species group in the UK. However with greater Irish participation, it will be possible to rotate these meetings between Britain and Ireland. COFORD Workshop - Developing effective market-led grower co-operatives

COFORD is funding a desk study (MarCo) to develop marketled grower co-operatives. The Western Forestry Co-op is conducting this study with Galway-Mayo Institute of Technology, University of Ulster and Dr Philip Blackstock.

The objective of this desk study is to identify the most suitable and cost effective support structures for private forestry in Ireland, with a particular emphasis on providing market-led cooperative support that will ensure that quality farm-grown timber can be produced, brought to, and compete in, the market place.

It is important that the most effective co-operative structure is identified and that the financial implications of providing this form of support are considered.

A stakeholder workshop is being held to present progress to date and to gather comments, suggestions and concerns from all parties.

Wood For Energy 2002
